
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Who Is Central and What Do We Do?

Central Board Member Roles

The President and Vice President

are elected by delegates to the Central Representative Assembly. The President is the executive officer and spokesperson for Central, presides over all meetings of the Executive Board and Representative Assemblies, and appoints all committees and their chairpersons with the advice and approval of the Executive Board. The Vice President assumes the duties of the President in their absence and perform other duties as directed by the President and the Executive Board.

Ohio's **NEA Directors** are elected by delegates to the OEA Representative Assembly. Their role is to represent Central members as they lobby in D.C., taking concerns to our federal lawmakers and acting as a liaison between the NEA Board of Directors and OEA's Board and membership.

OEA Directors are elected by delegates to the OEA Representative Assembly. Central has nine OEA Directors in Units 1-8 and an Education Support Professional (ESP) At-Large Director. Their role includes representing Central on all matters before the OEA Board of Directors and acting as a liaison between the Central Executive Board and the OEA Board of Directors.

Central Area Representatives are elected by delegates to the Central Representative Assembly from their specific area. Areas 1-5 are based on counties within the Central OEA/NEA District. Their role includes acting as a liaison with their area association leaders and membership and reporting concerns to the Central Executive Board.

ESP Representatives are elected by Central's ESP members. The number of ESP representatives reflects the proportion of Central's ESP members. Their role includes acting as a liaison between ESPs and the Central Executive Board.

The **Central Board** also includes a Retired Representative, a SCOPE Representative and a Student Representative, all appointed annually by the Board.

Supporting the Board are the **Fiscal Manager, Communications & Organizing Coordinator** and **Project manager.**

Why Me?

Should I be a delegate to the Representative Assembly?

I'm sure most of you have seen OEA's document on the Top 10 Reasons to Belong, which outlines some of the best reasons to become members of OEA. But let's talk about why you

should become a delegate to the OEA's Representative Assembly (RA).

The RA is the policy-making body of the Association. The OEA RA meets twice a year, typically in December and in May, in Columbus to establish OEA's policies and objectives, elect officers, establish dues, adopt the Association budget, adopt/evaluate a legislative program, act on resolutions and new business items, and conduct other necessary for the business of the OEA.

The RA is made up of members who have been elected as delegates to represent their Local Associations. Suppose you haven't been elected as a delegate and want to see what happens at an RA. In that case, you are welcome to attend the OEA RA as a guest, but according to the OEA Constitution and Bylaws provisions or policy, as a guest, you are unable to debate and vote on any of the issues.

So, why me?

POWER

You will have voting power. Your local is not like any other local in Ohio. We all have similarities, but like we are as individuals, all locals are unique. Being a delegate to the RA allows us to vote for things that matter to our locals, whether large or small, in a rural or urban area. You can vote for things that matter to YOUR local. You get to add your voice to over 121,000 other voices across the state.

VOICE

As educators, we are the experts when it comes to knowing what is best for our students. As a delegate to the RA, you can use your voice to move action items to ensure state policy provides those students with a quality public education. Your voice allows you to be a part of selecting who represents us at the state and national levels. You can share your personal experiences as an educator with others from around the state, and those collective voices matter and make a difference!

NETWORKING

As a delegate to the RA, you have the opportunity to network with other educators from across the state of Ohio. You can talk with members from locals who have problems similar to your local. You can get ideas from different locals and share what has been successful with your locals. As a delegate, you realize that you are not alone. We are all in this together and can be successful together.

KNOWLEDGE

When you attend the OEA Representative Assembly (OEA RA), you are the person who becomes the point of information. You will return to your Association's members with knowledge about the goals all OEA members have charged OEA leadership with for the upcoming year. Members will look to you to keep them informed about OEA's business, legislative issues, and political agendas.

So, why me? Why wouldn't you?

Power Up is an annual conference, brought to you by your Membership Development Committee. Earn CEUs while learning about various topics such as Implementing PBIS Correctly in Schools, Student Assault and Altercations.

Agenda and date will be communicated after the beginning of the school year.

The Diversity Committee is excited to present the virtual Diversity Conference on February 7th. Past sessions have educated members on diverse topics such as dyslexia, economic and social justice, rural education, second language learners, and much more.

Mark your calendar for Thursday, June 4, 2026 - **Local Leadership Training.** Regardless of your position in your association, this provides a deeper insight into the roles and responsibilities of local leadership found within your association, while providing an opportunity to learn how other locals function and handle issues of the day.

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Grants, Grants, Grants and Incentives!

It pays to get involved...literally! Up to \$1250 in Local Participation Incentives can be earned for each Local this year! Ask not what your union can do for you, but what you can do for your union. You can run as a delegate to the Central and OEA Representative Assemblies, attend Area meetings, or attend one of Central's professional development opportunities. We are happy to help you get started and support you in any of these activities—just ask! Check out our website for activities and register there.

Central OEA/NEA'S **Public Relations Grant** is designed to provide support to Locals whose members are engaging with the community. Grant funds can be used for a variety of items, or activities including, but not limited to apparel, awards, banners, buttons, fair/festival booths, involvement in community charitable events, sponsoring youth events, races, community parades, or yard signs to welcome kindergarteners or honor graduates. If you have an activity that will bolster the image of your Local in the community, please share your ideas with other Local leaders! Central's Locals are eligible for a Public Relations Grant of up to \$500 once every three years.

Central's **Growth & Development Grant** is as easy as ever, and there is no limit to the number of times or the amount for which a Local can apply. We want to keep your Local strong and build leadership. To that end, the online application now includes a menu of growth and development activities based on activities proven to develop new leaders and engage members. As a union member, we encourage you to volunteer to work with your Local leadership to check out the menu and choose a few activities for the year, then apply. These may be activities that your Local has wanted to try but lacked the funding to get started, or things you've done in the past that are tried and true. Let us help you get the ball rolling. Your Local's GDG coordinator can earn a stipend from Central.

The **Local Emergency Grant Program** was created to assist Local Associations with projects of an immediate or urgent nature. Community initiatives such as a school district levy or bond campaigns are examples of activities that align with the intended target of these grants. Some funding has been used for: postcards, postage, printing costs, refreshments for levy committee meetings, support to the levy committee, etc. This grant is available to all of our Locals once a year, and Local Association leadership may apply for this as needed.

As a member, you can work with Local leaders to assist in the application process. Central grant applications are reviewed monthly throughout the school year, and Locals may apply for each type of grant. We look forward to seeing your Local applications soon! The Local Retreat is scheduled for Monday and Tuesday, June 8 and 9, 2026. This offers a time and space for locals to work, organize, and address the most pressing needs of their association. Teams can work on negotiation prep, planning for the next school year, work on budgets, update C&Bs, or just take the time to bond as a team. The time is yours and how you plan it is up to you.

NEA has a program that allows educators to earn micro-credential certificates. The micro-credential program has the benefit of being personal, flexible, and performance-based for the educator. Learn more at www.nea.org/professional-excellence/professional-learning/micro-credentials.

Know Your Weingarten Rights

Every OEA member is guaranteed the right to union representation during an investigatory interview conducted by his or her employer if the interview could in any way lead to discipline, including termination, or could affect the member's personal or working conditions. In this situation, the member should request that an association representative or officer be present at the meeting. Without this representation, the member has the right to choose not to answer any questions per the United States Supreme Court case of NLRB v. J. Weingarten, Inc., 420 U.S. 251 (1975). It is very important to remember that the employer does not have to advise an employee of his or her rights under Weingarten.

OEA suggests that representation occur any time the purpose of the meeting is any of the following:

- Any type of disciplinary action;
- Investigation meeting;
- Reprimand;
- Infraction of a work rule or board policy;
- Questions concerning a request or use of any leave;
- Allegations of abuse; and
- Parental, student or community complaint.

Members should ask their principal, supervisor, or other management personnel to clarify the purpose of the meeting to determine if association representation is needed. We recommend using the following language to ensure your rights:

If the discussion I am being asked to enter into could in any way lead to my discipline or termination or affect my personal working conditions, I ask that an association representative or officer be present at the meeting. Without representation, I choose not to answer any questions. That is my right under a U.S. Supreme Court decision called Weingarten.

When the employee makes the request for an Association Representative to be present, the employer can do any of the following: (1) stop questioning until the representative arrives; (2) cancel the interview; or (3) tell the employee it will cancel the interview unless the employee voluntarily gives up his or her rights to representation. No member should ever waive his or her right to representation.

Serving on a Central Committee

Your experience, expertise and voice are needed and can help shape the direction of Central's many programs.

Committees typically meet once a month, with most meetings held virtually. Central provides a meeting stipend.

Here are the committees you can apply to serve on:

Constitution and Bylaws

Periodically reviews the governing documents and makes recommendations for changes. Handling the details of preparing ballots, conducting elections, and other election-related responsibilities.

Convention Planning

Plans and implements the annual Representative Assembly.

Awards Committee

Designs an award program for effective Local Associations and outstanding association leaders and nominating potential award recipients.

Finance Committee

Recommends an annual budget and oversees expenditures, administering grant programs, and fiscal oversight of the Association.

Membership Development Committee

Plans conferences and workshops for local leaders and membership designed to meet Local Association needs and personal professional growth.

Membership Engagement

Plans strategies for engaging a diverse cross-section of members in Association leadership (i.e., Minorities, ESP and Retired members).

Member Communications Committee

Makes recommendations related to effective communications between the Association and its members.

Organizing Committee

Reviews the NEA competencies on organizing to determine how to best serve our members. Mobilizing members into action to become education advocates.

Join an OEA Caucus
